ACADEMIC UPDATES

THIRD QUARTER PROGRESS- The Ren Web report that you receive this weekend will include grades through the halfway point of the third quarter. Please thoughtfully review the report with your children. Look for and celebrate successes and determine if there are areas that can be improved on. The third quarter is often the most challenging for many reasons. Set realistic goals that can be achieved by the end of the quarter (March 21) and work with your children to stay focused and motivated to achieve them.

TENTATIVE SECOND SEMESTER EXAM SCHEDULE – Here we are, already quickly moving through the second half of the school year. End of the year exams will be here before we know it. All classes have exams and exams must be taken at the scheduled times. Students who miss semester exams for reasons other than illness (who will be given the opportunity to make up the exams) will receive an F for those examinations.

Just a reminder regarding the seniors- only exam exemption policy: Seniors may be exempt from second semester exams if: 1) the course is a two-semester course; 2) the teacher chooses to allow exam exemptions; 3) third and fourth quarter grades average to at least a 93; 4) fine arts requirements must have been completed by Friday, March 21, and community service requirements by Friday, April 25, 2025.

Students enrolled in AP courses must take the AP exam AND teacher-developed final exams. Seniors who meet exam exemption requirements for their AP classes may be exempt from teacher- developed final exams. Seniors in non-AP classes who choose to take AP exams will also take teacher-developed final exams unless they meet the exemption standards. Non-seniors who choose to take an AP exam for an AP class in which they are not enrolled must take the final exam for their class.



SCHEDULING AND ADMISSIONS FOR 2025-26

RE-ENROLLMENT FOR CURRENT STUDENTS —Enrollment forms for returning students were due by February 14 with the \$200 deposit to reserve your child's spot for 2025-26. Please turn your form in ASAP if you have not yet done so. Registration forms with course offerings and selections will be distributed in April. Now students should be focused on doing their best in their current classes. Grades and work ethic are important factors in course placement for the coming year.

NEW STUDENTS FOR 2025-2026— The Admissions Committee is in the midst of the admissions cycle for the 2025-26 school year. Applications for all grade levels are now available online (<u>www.charlestoncatholic-crw.org</u>). Applications

will be completed and submitted online. Detailed instructions are available on the CCHS website. Please refer prospective families to the website!

Admissions Testing

All students applying to CCHS will take an admissions test prior to their application being reviewed. Any rising 6th grader from Sacred Heart Grade School will take their admissions test at SHGS during the school day. All other students and families will coordinate admissions testing with <u>Kasey Sporck</u> by calling the school office.

Admissions Timeline and Calendar

Friday, February 21- deadline for all applications for first round consideration

Friday, March 7 – first round of acceptance letters mailed (for applicants whose files are completed by **February 21** – applications received after February 21 will be reviewed periodically by the Admissions Committee and notification as to enrollment status will be mailed at that time)

NOTE – It is rare for CCHS to accept students as juniors and seniors. Only juniors and seniors moving into the area will be considered.

TUITION AND CALENDAR INFORMATION FOR 2025-26

TUITION RATES FOR 2025-26— The coming school year will require continued, careful planning in our spending and in our budgeting. CCHS is financially independent. The school runs solely on the income generated each year from tuition and fees. Unfortunately, costs continue to rise. To operate in a fiscally responsible manner, tuition increases for 2025-26 will be required and are being determined. The increase will fall in the 8-12% range. We have a number of financial aid opportunities available for families who need them. If you have concerns about tuition once it is released, please contact Mrs. Shindle or Mrs. Hoyer to talk about opportunities that are available. Tuition rates will be released in mid-April and invoices and loan information will be mailed at that time. The Hope Scholarship is projected to be \$5267 for the 2025-26 school year, so it is a significant help to tuition for those who have qualified either by transferring from public school or completing dual enrollment. Tuition payment in full is due June 15 (late charge assessed at \$1.00 per day after June 15).

IMPORTANT DATES FOR DIOCESAN TUITION ASSISTANCE—For the thirty-fourth consecutive year, the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston will continue its tradition of offering the Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) in an effort to keep Catholic school education affordable for families who desire it but who may need some financial assistance to make that dream a reality. Thanks to Most Reverend Mark Brennan's commitment to Catholic education, funds have once again been allocated for distribution to families in need of assistance. This year, Phase 1 will be open to Catholic families only, but Phases 2 and 3 will be open to Catholic and non-Catholic families!! Awards are based upon a family's degree of need relative to all other applicants. Apply on-line at www.factsmgt.com. Click on "Grant and Aid Assessment" and log in. Have your 2024 tax information available. Catholic families with children currently enrolled or who are applying to enroll for the 2025-2026 school year should apply ASAP. Applications opened February 1. Phase 1 families must belong to a parish included on the drop-down list as part of the on-line application. The deadline for Phase 1 is April 30, 2025; the Phase 2 deadline is July 14, 2025, and; the Phase 3 deadline is August 23, 2025. No assistance will be available from the Diocese or from any school unless an application and all required documentation is submitted, and the fee has been paid by the deadline. The application fee to families is \$25. Families should only submit one application per year, not one per phase!

The programs are based on the premise that West Virginia's youth must be provided with special opportunities for learning and personal development in order for them to realize their full potential. There is no cost to families of students who are accepted to these competitive programs. Those who have attended these programs in the past describe them as "life-changing." - 2.) **PROMISE scholarship and FAFSA deadline** March 1st. All students in the Class of 2025 must complete BOTH the PROMISE and the FAFSA applications in order to be considered for the PROMISE scholarship. Additionally, colleges and universities throughout the country use FAFSA information to determine scholarships and financial aid.
- 3.) **Juniors--mark your calendars!** On April 8th, CCHS will participate in the SAT School Day (a *free* test administered to all CCHS juniors; students are already registered for this test). Students will take the SAT at CCHS during a school day.
- 4.) **SAT and ACT** testing and registration information is available online at --<u>www.collegeboard.org</u> and <u>www.act.org</u> (CCHS code: 490-205). All juniors should take each test at least once this year. Students will be taking the <u>SAT School</u> <u>Day at CCHS on Tuesday, April 8th</u>. There are many ways for students to practice and prepare for the SAT and the ACT.
- 5.) College representatives are visiting, and these meetings typically take place during lunch. Dates and times will be sent out in the Sunday email from Mrs. Hoyer, and students will be reminded on the morning and afternoon announcements. All high school students should take advantage of this opportunity to learn more about different colleges. Colleges and universities want to see that students are interested in them!

<u>COLLEGE VISITS</u> - Juniors and seniors are encouraged to visit colleges to help in the college selection process. Juniors and seniors wishing to visit colleges during a scheduled school day will not be penalized for attendance purposes if they do not exceed a total of **2 days for seniors and 2 days for juniors**. In order to be approved, requests for college visits must be submitted in writing (form in academic advisor's office) at least 48 hours prior to the visit for approval by the academic advisor and principal. Visits must be completed by May 1.

<u>VIRTUS</u> — Be sure you're able to help! All parents or other adults who volunteer, coach, drive students, chaperone, etc., are required by the Diocese to complete the diocesan sexual abuse awareness training before being allowed to work with our students. Training is available online or at sessions periodically scheduled. To begin, visit the VirtusOnline.org and choose the online option. Allow 1- 1½ hours to complete the program. In addition to the training, employees and volunteers are required to complete a background check and sign off on the Form Policy Relating to Sexual Abuse of Children MUST be completed online before you are able to volunteer. You must add Charleston Catholic as a location where you will be volunteering. If you have forgotten your password, or your user name, you can also call the Virtus help desk at 1-888-847-8870.

The Bishop has announced and widely publicized his desire for continuing Safe Environment education for all employees and volunteers throughout the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston. As a result, all employees and volunteers are required to update the training to Version 4.0 of Protecting God's Children. Please visit www.virtus.org at your earliest convenience and log in and complete the training module. Once you log in to your VIRTUS account, you will find the link for the module by clicking the box that says "Current Training." Going forward, the Bishop requires all employees and volunteers to complete a yearly awareness training module and monthly bulletins. You may complete the module and the bulletins from anywhere you have an internet connection and at your convenience.

Additionally, adults who volunteer, coach, or chaperone, may be asked to update background and policy forms. Background checks must be updated every three years. Please contact Mr. Villers with any questions about how to update your forms.

The Diocese encourages reporting to civil authorities first and foremost if a crime has been committed. EIGHTH GRADE WV WRITING CONTEST—Goldenseal Magazine has partnered with Charleston Catholic to offer the Fourth Annual Goldenseal Magazine Young Writers Contest! The winner of the essay contest will have his/her article published in the state's Goldenseal Magazine. What a wonderful opportunity to become a published author before finishing middle school! All Charleston Catholic eighth graders will be participating. Their articles must be at least 750 words in length and no longer than 2000 words. <u>GOLDEN HORSESHOE</u> - A highlight of the eighth-grade year is the opportunity for a student to become a Knight or Lady of the Golden Horseshoe. Named for the golden horseshoes given to the early explorers of what is now West

Virginia by Alexander Spotswood, the Governor of the Virginia colony, the program recognizes students for their knowledge of West Virginia history. In the coming weeks, eighth-grade students from all over the state will take a computerized assessment on West Virginia history, facts, and trivia. Top scorers from each county are awarded their Golden Horseshoes by the Governor in a ceremony at the Capitol. Charleston Catholic's test date is scheduled for March 20. Students have been gathering information in WV Studies class, but additional practice questions can be found on the WV Culture and History website (wvculture.org) and the WV Department of Education website.

HOPE 2025 UPDATE – Planning continues for our 20th summer of HOPE. Members of the junior class have applied to participate in our week of home construction and repair, June 15-20, 2025. We will partner again this coming summer with Bill & Addie Likens, who coordinate the Cabwaylingo Appalachian Mission (CAM) in Wayne and Mingo Counties. Our group of CCHS students, college age alumni and adult work team leaders will make significant repairs at the homes of several low-income families and seniors. Some of our volunteers will also assist with the construction of a new house for a family in need. We are committed to raising \$25,000 to purchase building materials for the construction of the new home. CAM will supplement our fundraising efforts with the materials necessary to complete the construction of the new home and to make the repairs on the other houses at which we will work, making these houses warmer, safer, and drier. Our annual funding appeal is underway with a link to make a tax deductible donation available on the school website. A slideshow of our 2024 HOPE experience is posted there as well.





- 1.) Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 5th. Lent is the 40 days of fasting, prayer and almsgiving that prepare us for Good Friday and then Easter. For almsgiving Catholic Relief Services Rice Bowls will be available in all theology classes. Proceeds from the Rice Bowl reach communities in 101 countries including the United States. Twenty-five percent of our proceeds is given to Catholic Charities here in West Virginia.
- 2.) The Knights of Columbus will hold a Fish Fry at Sacred Heart each Friday of Lent, not including Good Friday. Student volunteers are needed 5:30-8:00. Sign up on the service Google Classroom.
- 3.) Charleston Catholic students will have the opportunity to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation on March 26th. Sometimes students as well as adults can be nervous about receiving the sacrament. The priests who administer the sacrament are each friendly and approachable, and they are happy to walk us through the sacrament.
- 4.) On April 2nd we will have a combined 7th and 8th Grade Retreat lead by NET Ministries. NET Retreats use peer-to-peer ministry to bring God's love to retreatants. During the retreat, our Middle School students will be part of large group presentations, small group discussions, personal testimonies, a dedicated time of prayer, fun

- and friendship! The retreat will be at the Sacred Heart Pavilion. Permission forms will be distributed at the end of March.
- 5.) The 10th Grade Retreat will be on April 9th. The West Virginia Institute of Spirituality led by Sister Molly Maloney will host the sophomores for their retreat. It will be a thoughtful day reflecting on the Beatitudes. Permission forms will be distributed at the end of March.

- 2.) Thanks to all of our lunch volunteers! Please take notice of the weekly reminder emails as the lunch times may vary based upon mass schedules and alternate bell schedules. If there is a change in schedule, it will be noted in the reminder email. Some volunteers will need to renew their food handlers' cards. Megan will give you information to do so once you have emailed her. Please indicate in your email if it has been more than two years since you took your food handlers course.
- **3.) Parent involvement** is a vital component of the successful operation of the CCHS athletic program. Working gates and concession stands, being supportive of the players and coaches, and attending games are important pieces. EVERY parent of an athlete is needed to support the teams. - 4.) Athletic family passes are available through the PVA.
